Principal's Report

29th May 2014, Newsletter No. 8

As you would know, the aim of our school is to provide high quality teaching and programs so that our students can 'be the best that they can be'. At both campuses, students are constantly engaged in a diverse range of learning activities and display the school values of personal best, happiness, cooperation, respect and honesty.

On Monday 19th May, we were visited by Colin Schot, Concord School's previous

Principal, and 20 representatives from the Singapore Education Department and Apple Computers. Colin was Principal of Concord School for over 10 years and is now Principal of Warringa Park School at Hopper's Crossing. The visitors came to gain an understanding of how we use technology to enhance the learning of our students. We explained that we use a variety of interactive whiteboards, netbooks, notebooks, iPads and Apple Macs for particular learning purposes with students in different sections of the school. Our visitors also saw a demonstration version of a robot named 'Nao' that we have ordered to further engage our students in their learning.

Please remember that there are two days early in June when your child is not required at school. There is a public holiday on **Monday 9th June** and a school Curriculum Day on the following day, **Tuesday 10th June**.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability

Our school is participating in the **Nationally Consistent Collection of Data** on School Students with Disability (Data Collection). This Data Collection is taking place in government, Catholic and Independent schools across Australia, and will provide valuable information about supports required for a broad group of students. This will enable Australian and State governments to better target support and resources in schools. This in turn will help schools give students with disability the support they need.

The Data Collection is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities. It uses a very broad definition of disability, taken from the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the *Disability Standards for Education 2005*, which describe a broad range of health and learning conditions for which schools are required to provide 'reasonable adjustments' to support students to participate on the same basis as other students. The Data Collection will take place during Terms 2 and 3. No personal or identifying information about any student will be included, however if you decide you do not wish information about your child to be included in the Data Collection, you can opt-out by signing and returning the opt-out consent form at the end of this Newsletter by Friday 6th June. Sick Students

Our next meeting will be held on **Monday 2nd June at 1.30pm** at the Grimshaw Campus.





Dear Parent/Carer,

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability

Our school is participating in the Nationally Consistent Data Collection on School Students with Disability (the Data Collection) which is taking place in schools across Australia this year. This letter explains what information is being collected and what happens if you decide to opt-out of the Data Collection.

What is the Data Collection?

The Data Collection will collect information about students with a disability who require support to participate in education on the same basis as other students.

The *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (DDA) describes a very broad range of health and learning conditions. Under the DDA and the Disability Standards for Education 2005 schools have obligations to ensure that students with these conditions are able to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. This includes providing reasonable adjustments where needed, in consultation with the student's parents, carers or guardians.

This Data Collection aims to gather information about how many students in schools have a health or learning condition requiring adjustments be made to support their access to and participation in education. The Data Collection is not limited to students with diagnosed disabilities, and will collect valuable information about supports provided to a much wider group of students than those previously included in individually targeted disability support programs such as the Program for Students with Disabilities.

Why is this information being collected?

The Data Collection aims to provide more accurate and complete information about the number and distribution of Australian school students with disability as well as the adjustments provided to enable them to access education on the same basis as students without disability.

The Data Collection will inform future policy and planning for the provision of education services around the country and ensure that there is a nationally consistent approach to identifying students with disability.

What information is being collected?

The Data Collection will collect:

- · whether the school is metropolitan or non-metropolitan, primary or secondary
- the total number of students enrolled at the school
- the total number of students at the school receiving adjustments to enable them to participate in education on the same basis as other students
- the level of adjustment provided to those students
- · the students' broad type of disability.

How will the information be collected?

Our school will determine the number of students with disability, adjustments that are provided and the broad category of disability for each of those students.

As school principal, I will verify there is evidence to support the inclusion of these students in the Data Collection. This may include reviewing your child's learning plans and consulting with you, your child and/or their teachers.

Once the data has been collected, our school staff will de-identify the data so that no student names are captured.

What will happen to the information collected?

In August, we will record and submit numbers only to the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development (the Department). The Department will then provide total numbers at a State level to the Commonwealth Department of Education. This data will be transmitted securely.

The Commonwealth Department of Education will use the information collected to inform policy development in the area of Education in the future.

Both the Department and the Commonwealth Department of Education will take steps to aggregate the data sufficiently so that no student's identity could reasonably be ascertained.

What happens if you opt-out?

Involvement in the Data Collection is optional and you may 'opt-out' at any time.

There are no consequences if you choose to opt-out of the Data Collection. If you want to opt-out, complete and return the attached form by Friday, 6th June or contact me on the number below. Complete one opt-out form for each child.

What happens if you do not opt-out?

De-identified information about your child may be included in the 2014 Data Collection.

Accessing your child's information

You can access and correct the personal and health information about your child held by the Department. If you wish to access and correct your child's personal and/or health information, please contact me.

Does your child have difficulty focusing or seem distracted?

Problems in attention often result in difficulties in learning and can result in disruptive behaviour at home and in the classroom. Monash University is working on the first project to develop a validated attention training game using android technology.

The game will run on a tablet (similar to an Ipad) and participants will be allowed to keep the tablet once their participation in the study is complete.

Who can take part?

If you have a child aged between 4 – 10 years who has an intellectual disability then you are eligible to take part.

FREE PARENTING SUPPORT GROUPS



Parents of children with a developmental delay or a disability, aged 2 to 12 years, are eligible for free parenting support as part of the Stepping Stones Triple P Project.

Monash University is running free parenting groups in the Stepping Stones Triple P – Positive Parenting Program for parents or caregivers of children with a developmental delay or disability.

Parents will learn skills and strategies to promote child development, teaching new skills, and managing difficult behaviours.

Stepping Stones Seminar Series

Seminars tackle the most common issues for parents of children with a disability. Each seminar lasts 90 minutes and you can do one, two or all three in the series. The topics covered are Positive Parenting for Children with a Disability; Helping your Child Reach their Potential; and Changing Problem Behaviour into Positive Behaviour.

Primary Care Stepping Stones

This is a brief, personal and tailored way to get your Stepping Stones support. You'll meet with a practitioner for about four sessions of between 15 and 30 minutes each time, tackling one or two specific behaviours or issues you're concerned about. You could target anything from your child's fears and anxiety to mealtime dramas or toilet training problems.

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Standard Stepping Stones

This is more in-depth and is recommended for families with significant problems at home. There are 8–10 personal consultations with a trained practitioner who'll help you develop a wide range of positive parenting skills. Each session takes about an hour. When you've finished Standard Stepping Stones you should feel confident enough to tackle just about any difficult parenting issue.

Triple P Self-Help Workbook

Between caring for your child with a disability and juggling the demands of daily life, you may be too busy or live too far away to join a group parenting session or see a practitioner one-on-one. Over about 10 sessions, a self-help workbook will show you how to teach your child new skills and manage common behavioural and developmental issues.


